Local Church asked to Participate in "The Windsor Castle Celebration of Plans for Generational Change for A Living Planet" in London, England

**Baltimore, Maryland. (October 13, 2009)-** Bishop Walter S. Thomas and singers of the New Psalmist Baptist Church will travel to London, England to participate in "The Windsor Castle Celebration of Plans for Generational Change for a Living Planet" in London, England, November 2-4, 2009. This is a worldwide gathering of representatives from all of the major faiths, United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki Moon, His Royal Highness Prince Phillip, the Alliance of Religions and Conservation and many others, who will join together to discuss ways in which the major religions can impact the environment. Singers from New Psalmist will perform an original song, "That's What the Cross Would Say" as well as participate in the performance "Hearing the Voices of Creation." The group will introduce this song to New Psalmist on Sunday October 18<sup>th</sup> when the church celebrates creation.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for our church family," states Bishop Thomas. As Christians, we have an obligation to be good stewards over the resources God has given us. We are working diligently to do just this." While in London, Bishop Thomas has been asked to be one of the inspirational speakers at Windsor Celebration event, and New Psalmist will be submitting it plans for addressing environmental and natural resource issues.

Singers from the church will sing about creation during the conference. Mr. Patrick Alston and Mr. James Morant, both from New Psalmist have collaborated on the writing/arranging of an entirely new composition called "That's What the Cross Would Say", which is drawn from an Anglo-Saxon poem written in 635 AD. The poem, titled "The Dream of the Rood", The group will also perform a high-energy, gospel arrangement of "All Creatures of Our God and King", as well as an ancient composition drawn from Psalm 148, in conjunction with Rabbi Lionel Rosenfeld, who will perform with the New Psalmist Choir for that particular composition.
